

BRATTLEBORO, VT-January 21, 2022-Vermont Independent Media (VIM), publisher of The Commons will host a panel discussion with Vermont publishers/editors about the future of local journalism on Wednesday, February 2 at 7:00 p.m. on Zoom.

VIM's panelists will discuss the turmoil in local journalism today and how publishers and editors are dedicated to keeping newspapers alive. Panelists include: Art Cullen. Pulitzer Prize winning editor of the Storm Lake Times: Tim Calabro, editor/publisher, The White River Valley Herald; Angelo Lynn, publisher/editor, Addison Independent; Randolph Holhut, news editor, The Commons; Melanie Winters, news editor, The Brattleboro Reformer.

The discussion previews the screening of the awardwinning documentary Storm Lake presented by Middlebury New Filmmakers Festival at Next Stage Arts on Friday, February 4 at 7:00 p.m. The film depicts the triumph and struggle of the Storm Lake Times and poses the question:'Does American democracy survive without the backbone of independent local journalism.'

The newspaper industry has been in steady decline triggered by a loss in readership and ad revenue which have been migrating to other media, most notably digital. Then came the pandemic and ensuing sluggish economy that impacted core advertisers and promotion of community

events causing major decline not know itself." in advertising revenue.

According to the New York Times over the last 15 years, more than 1 in 5 newspapers has closed. Readers across the country told the Times in a 2019 survey how they were affected by the decline of local news: "Our community does

The panel discussion represents one of a series of events VIM has been producing around media education as part of our Media Mentoring Project, says Lynn Barrett, president. VIM's board founders envisioned a forum for community participation



and media education that would build media skills among residents, students and the disenfranchised and to reach these audiences through public workshops and special events. Local journalism students have also been invited to the event to not only listen in, but to ask questions.

The discussion will be hosted by Tim (Johnson) Arsenault, a 48-year broadcaster and member of the Vermont Association of Broadcasters Hall of Fame who works part time for WTSA FM in Brattleboro.

A Positive Step Forward

The New Hampshire House of Representatives met in full session at the DoubleTree by Hilton in downtown Manchester on January 5 and 6 to act upon the last bills from 2021 and to open the new 2022 legislative year. The NH House is comprised of 400 elected officials equally representing the state's near 1.4 million population. Attendance for each of the session days was excellent, with approximately 365 reps participating with the remainder absent due to medical, personal, business or other reasons.

Approximately 195 bills

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sored by me, was HB214, relative to school building aid grants. As the community of Haverhill knows, I view school building aid an extremely important factor that contributes to student academic success and preparedness for a successful career. There is no question, that recent building aid grant funds awarded to SAU 23 for renovating and upgrading Woodsville High School have significantly improved the facility and learning opportunity for students. As amended by the education committee, HB214 provides the Department of Education statutory authority and a path to funding support to complete a facility condition assessment of all statewide public school buildings and identify a priority list. The department has been directed to design and implement a process through an open contractual arrangement to utilize a visiting team including an architect, engineer, and education policy professional to assess the condition of the state's estimated 33 million square feet of school facilities. Funds to support this endeavor are currently held within the Public School Infrastructure Fund that is managed by a commission chaired by the representative from Haverhill.

In 1847, the NH Commissioner of Common Schools stated, "the success of our whole system of education depends upon as much on a thorough reform in the construction and care of schoolhouses as upon any other circumstance whatever." This statement is just as true today, as it was 175 years ago. With the passage of this legislation, the department will finally be able to accurately identify schools that may need construction or major reconstruction. In the future, in accordance with this legislation, schools seeking building aid support from the state will have to have in place a long-range capital improvement program. As with the 10 year highway and bridge capital needs plan, community and locally elected officials must

Once again, although only 27% of bills were passed this past week, I am very optimistic that HB214 will move forward and receive support in the Senate and from the Governor.

NEK Chamber Jan. 31 Legislative Forum Will Be on Zoom

The Northeast Kingdom Chamber of Commerce will hold its first legislative update of the year, by Zoom, on Monday, Jan. 31, from 8 to 9 a.m. The program starts with a short update from the chamber, continues with legislator reports addressing key issues and concludes with a question-and-answer period at the end of the event.

Expected issues to be discussed include Covid-19 and its impact, health care, labor and economic development issues, taxes and fiscal policies, not to mention the many issues that arise during the session. Laural Ruggles will serve as co-host of the online meetalong with NEK ing Chamber Director Darcie McCann.

"After much deliberation, the chamber has decided to go online until the Covid numbers go down," said

McCann, as virus numbers are at an all-time high. "This format will allow constituents to receive updates from legislators until we believe it is safe to meet again." Until further notice, upcoming legislative meetings will be held online.

McCann noted that the format of the gatherings will remain the same, despite the online component of the forum, including the question-and-answer period.

"In the past, we have made it very clear to our guests that they are encouraged to ask questions of the legislators but they will not be allowed to grandstand on issues or be disrespectful to the legislators. It was not tolerated at our previous sessions and will not be on these online forums either," said McCann. "We understand these are troubling and challenging times but we request civility from par-

ticipants."

Reassessment, Tax Rates, and your Tax Bill

This year the Town of Haverhill went through a property revaluation, also called a reassessment. This is done every five (5) years through a cyclical assessing contract in accordance with NH State law RSA 75:8-a "Five-Year Valuation". Reassessments are overseen by the Department of Revenue Administration (DRA) and must be approved by local officials. The new 2021 reassessment values for the Town of Haverhill were approved by the Select Board on August 30, 2021. This 5vear reassessment resulted in a 16% overall increase in values. However, some properties saw a larger increase, and some saw a smaller increase in value, depending upon where in Town the property resides. In addition, residential properties saw a much larger increase than commercial properties.

This year the Town of Haverhill realized a significant drop in the Town's tax rate. The Town's tax rate decreased by \$3.52 per \$1,000 of property valuation. The 2021/2022 tax rate is the lo-

west tax rate since 2012. and Town officials were looking forward to celebrating this significant achievement with taxpayers.

However, the decreased tax rate was unable to completely offset the increased values as a result of the cyclical revaluation and many taxpayers are still seeing an increase in their tax bills. Which was certainly a disappointment for everyone!

A Month In Italy - Part 1

In November of 2002, four ladies embarked on an adventure. They rented a house in Italy (sight unseen) and left in high spirits for Umbertide (pro-Trendy, nounced Um BER tee day), a walled town in the province of Umbria, 100 miles north of Rome. None of them knew the language, nor what to expect. Three of them had taught in the same school at different times, and the fourth was a high school classmate from 47 years


signed on. Carole had heard about the trip and was dying to be invited. Within a month she had bought her plane ticket, got her life in order and was set to go.

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

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More than \$100k Awarded by Lincoln-Woodstock Rotary to Community Efforts

On January 19, the Lincoln-Woodstock Rotary Club made presentations to five nonprofit civic endeavors in their northern NH communities, awarding a total of \$103,000 granted to Linwood Ambulance Service, Vet's Rest Stop, The Bridge Project, Lin-Wood Skate Park, and the Lin-Educational Trust Wood Fund.

Rotary International was founded with a mission of "service above self," and the local Club – chartered in 1951 - demonstrates that every year with their support of agencies and initiatives that serve the population of their shared communities.

With a long history of supporting the local education community, the Club established the Linwood Educational Trust Fund, Inc. decades ago with a major gift of \$100,000, and have continued support of students of the Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School District ever since. This year, after the interruptions of COVID, the Club awarded \$50,000 in addition to their annual gift of \$10,000 in support of scholarships.

Principal Mark Pribbernow, along with school and Foundation members Myles Moran, Bob Nelson, and Doug Moorhead accepted the grant. "Students are not only given the benefit of scholarships as a result of

this generosity but the 'giving back' example that starts with Rotary's contribution is a leadership example to the kids and to the community," said Pribbernow.

Primary financial support comes from an annual vehicle raffle, already underway for 2022. In the inaugural year, the raffle prize was a Chevy Chevette, years that followed offered a succession of brand new Corvettes, until a recent shift to America's favorite pickup, the Ford F150. A bright red, 2022 F150 Lariat edition truck is already on order and expected to arrive late May: tickets are available now for the raffle that will happen this coming September.

Lin-Wood Skate Park has been a vision for the communities for many years, and two of the foremost proponents, Kevin Bell and Brian Angelone, were on hand to receive a grant award of \$35,000 to close the funding gap on Phase One to begin scheduling construction. With this and other recent fundraising success, ground-breaking may begin as soon as Fall of 2022. "We consider it an investment that will benefit our communities for generations come," said Lynne to Club President. Warren, "And it continues to be a privilege to be serving in leadership with so many dedicated Club members

who consistently give of their time and effort to make outstanding presentations like these possible."

The Bridge Project, like the Educational Foundation, got its start as a Rotary Club initiative. The goal was to provide a space where people could feel comfortable asking for help. Since its inception in 2016. The Bridge Project has grown to support hundreds of community members by providing a connection point between at-risk individuals and group support networks. The Bridge Project was awarded \$10,000 in annual support.

An award of \$5,000 was given to the Vet's Rest Stop for building the Library of this ongoing project building a community center for area veterans of the armed services. Located in Woodstock, the goal is to offer services supporting the region's vets in a variety of ways. And Chief Dave Tauber was on hand to receive a \$3,000 grant to Linwood Ambulance Service in support of their life-saving AED service to the communities.

The Lincoln-Woodstock Rotary Club, and their youth counterparts Interact and Early Act, all strive to live up to the Rotary International's motto of "Service above Self," and Club members pitch in on not only the fundraising activities but a wide

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
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Is Buyer's Remorse Setting in with Joe Biden's Voters?

Hunter's Hounds Terrorize Vermont¹¹ **Resident and Attack Her Dog**

STOWE, Vt – A Vermont POWVT.

resident and her dog were terrorized by a pack of hounds that were hunting covotes in Fairlee, Vermont. According to a police report just obtained through a public records request to the Vermont Fish & Wildlife Department (VFWD), a woman was biking with her dog last April when the dog was viciously attacked and injured by four hounds. This discovery comes at a time when legislation concerning hounding is being considered in Montpelier. "If a records request hadn't been filed, the public would never have known about yet another incident in which hound hunters failed to exercise control over their hounds," said Lisa Jablow, Board member for POWVT.

According to the report, the hounds chased the woman and her dog for over two miles, attacking the dog at least ten times until the woman was able to take refuge on a porch at an unoccupied cabin and fought off the hounds. She told police that she was convinced her dog was going to die. It took the coyote hound hunter, often referred to as hounders, 15 minutes to arrive at the scene and retrieve his hounds. The hound hunter was not fined, nor did he lose his hunting license because this dangerous and often reckless activity is allowed under current law. The dog survived but required treatment for deep puncture wounds.

"It's impossible for the public to know how many of these incidents occur each year in Vermont because Vermont Fish & Wildlife does not maintain complete or adequate records of most complaints about suspected violations of hunting and trapping laws," said Brenna Galdenzi, President of

While POWVT would like to see the use of hounds to hunt bears, covotes, raccoons, foxes, and bobcats banned due to the cruelty and frequent violation of landowners' rights involved in the practice, they support legislation that would require hound hunters to maintain both visual and verbal control over their hounds. There is a bill before the legislature right now, H.316, that addresses the lack of control as it relates to bear hounding. "Hound hunters release packs of hounds into the woods, including our public lands, to hunt coyotes, bears and other wildlife. The hounds are used as weapons and are under no control, which makes the activity even more dangerous," Galdenzi added. Tren



Some of the shrubs we offer include witch hazel, Eastern sand cherry, red osier dogwood, and red chokeberry. The District also sells balsam, Fraser fir, American arborvitae, American hornbeam, hackberry, scarlet oak, sugar maple and other trees. Several plant packages are also available to benefit a variety of wildlife.

GCCD also offers apples, strawberries. blueberries and raspberries for sale.

Many of the plants we offer are native to New Hampshire. Plants native to our area are adapted to growing in our region's soils and climate, requiring less maintenance (such as watering and fertilizing) than many introduced plants. Most of our plants are bareroot, meaning they were harvested at the plant nursery when the plants were dormant and will be ready for planting when you pick them up. Bareroot plants are affordable, hardy, have welldeveloped roots, and are easy to handle, transport and plant. The Plant Sale is our biggest fundraising activity each year. The money raised from this sale is used to support District workshops, tours, and educational activities including School to Farm Day with NH Ag in the Classroom and the NH Envirothon.

(3) Limit the number, location, or availability of mail ballot drop boxes - FL S.B. 90, GA S.B. 202, IA S.F. 413, IN S.B. 398 and Reduce polling place availability (locations or hours) IA S.F. 413, MT S.B.

196, TX S.B. 1 (4) Ban snacks and water to voters waiting in line FL S.B. 90, GAS.B. 202 and (5) Impose harsher voter ID requirements.

This brings me to Ms Anderson's comments of the requirement for Photo IDs. First it has been stated by a great many election officials that voter fraud is not an issue, and is very rare in the United Sates, Loser Trump filed 62 lawsuits alleging voter fraud or election irregularities, and lost 61 with several decisions made by judges he appointed. His lone win was a Pennsylvania judge ruled voters had 3 days after the election to provide proper ID and "cure" their ballots (and not more.) Voting is a right (with certain restrictions) not a privilege like the examples cited such as getting a license, boarding a plane, buying booze etc. When voter IDs are required they do indeed affect the poor and minority voters more than white voters. Underlying documents required to obtain ID cost money, a significant expense for lower-income Americans. The combined cost of document fees, travel expenses and waiting time are estimated to range from \$75 to \$175 as per the UCLA.

(a) From the ACLU, nationally, up to 25% of African-American citizens of voting age lack governmentissued photo ID, compared to only 8% of whites. (b) States exclude forms of ID in a discriminatory manner. Texas allows concealed weapons permits for voting, but does not accept student ID cards. Until its voter ID law was struck down, North Carolina prohibited public assistance IDs and state employee ID cards, which are disproportionately held by Black voters. And until recently, Wisconsin permitted active duty military ID cards, but prohibited Veterans Affairs ID cards for voting. (c) Voter ID laws are enforced in a discriminatory manner. A Caltech/MIT study found that minority voters are more frequently questioned about ID than are white voters. (d) Voter ID laws reduce turnout among minority voters. Several studies, including a 2014 GAO study, have found that photo ID laws have a particularly depressive effect on turnout among racial minorities and other vulnerable groups, worsening the participation gap between voters of color and whites.

So these laws have nothing to do with protecting the vote. But they have everything to do with suppressing the vote of the poor, the disabled, and racial minorities. I agree with Vice President Harris that these laws are rooted in racism.

Clean Water Act Settlement Put to Work for Local Conservation

NH BETHLEHEM, Community Action Works (formerly Toxics Action Center) and Conservation Law Foundation announced the settlement of their federal Clean Water Act lawsuit against Casella Waste Systems, Inc., and North Country Environmental Services. Inc., for the discharge of pollutants from the companies' Bethlehem Landfill into the Ammonoosuc River.

The parties' settlement agreement was signed and entered by U.S. District Judge Paul Barbadoro on January 11.

Under the terms of the settlement. Casella and NCES have two years to apply for all necessary permits to perform removal of contaminated sediments and site restoration work at the large seep and drainage channel located between the Landfill and the Ammonoosuc River. They then have one year to complete the cleanup project.

In addition, as part of the settlement, Casella and NCES are required to make a \$50,000 payment to fund "projects designed to pro-Times mote restoration, preservation, protection, and/or en-

hancement of water quality Trendv in the Ammonoosuc River watershed." beThe Ammonoosuc Conalways servation Trust (ACT) was chosen by the Conservation Law Foundation (CLF) and will Community Action Works, as a locally recognized and respected community organization, to partner with butthem by taking responsibility Trendy, for the use of the settlement funds. "ACT will use these funds and any other settleare ment funds that come from Not all Times



our continued partnership with CLF to protect the Ammonoosuc watershed and the people who depend on it" said Rosalind Page, ACT's Executive Director.

"It seems only right that an organization like ACT, filled with people who live and work in this often-forgotten part of the state, should have the opportunity to assure the money goes directly to preserving the envithat ronment our communities, families and generations future call home" she said.

ACT's mission statement calls for protecting the natural world, including clean water for all. "We intend to do that with these funds," Page continued, "just as we do with other grants we receive from sources like the NH Drinking Water and Groundwater Trust Fund which came from penalties imposed on companies and corporations that broke environmental laws leading to ground water contamination."

For many years, ACT has worked locally to protect water quality and drinking water through deliberate

and high-impact conservation projects in the region. About a third of their now 34 conserved properties have water quality conservation as part of the project impacts. You can find these projects from Bethlehem downriver to Bath and Haverhill. Most recently, in 2020, ACT conserved property in Bath which sits directly next to the intake well for the entire town's drinking water. These settlement funds will be put toward continuing the conservation of properties along the Ammonoosuc River and its tributaries.

Though water quality and protection have always been part of ACT's mission the organization sees this as an opportunity to focus more intentionally on water quality education and to help shed light on the many ways to address the critical issue of water protection.

It happened again last night, the phone rings and it is an unknown caller. someone with an interesting accent is telling me that I owe money and the sheriff is going to arrest me. I hang up. However, I have already made a mistake with this scam call -- I answered the phone.

Per the website, https://www.usa.gov/common-scams-frauds, there are people and organizations that are looking for new ways to steal your money or trick you out of your money. The fake phone calls are common and have been going on for may years. In this time of COVID-19, the scammers and frauds have another tool -- your fear.

It is very important to remember r- do not give your personal information over the phone. If you have not made the call to your doctor, banker or whomever, do not answer any questions from unknown people calling you. Remember, just because they call and say they are from your doctor or the government, that does not make it true.

Scammers change their methods frequently. Current coronavirus scams include: Identity theft when people post a photo of their vaccination card on social media -Don't post a photo of your vaccination card online. Scammers can see and steal your name, birthdate, and other personal information.

COVID-19 testing, vaccine, and treatment scams -

ting your stimulus check or offer you a way to get the money early.

FDIC and banking -People pretend to call from the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or your bank. They say your bank account or your ability to get cash are in danger and ask for your personal information.

Telephone scammers try to steal your money or personal information. Scams may come through phone calls from real people, robocalls, or text messages. Callers often make false promises, such as opportunities to buy products, invest your money, or receive free product trials. They may also offer you money through free grants and lotteries. Some scammers may call with threats of jail or lawsuits if you don't pay them. Thank you-https://www.usa. gov/common-scams-frauds.

Per Experian Information Solutions, https://www.ex-"Fraudsters perian.com, know people are most vulnerable when they're desperate or scared, and use crises and pressure tactics to prey on victims." They are very tricky and try to hit you when you are most in need. With cautious people being socially distanced, there are more people reaching out on social media or dating sites. "While romance scams aren't new, they're increasingly popular. According to the FTC, people lost \$304 million to romance scams in 2020, up from \$75 million in 2016.

social media apps to meet victims. There's no surefire method to detect a fake, although scammers may use attractive photos and avoid meeting in person - many use the coronavirus as an excuse.

After gaining your trust, they'll ask you to buy them something or send them money. Or, the person may "mistakenly" send you money and ask you to send it back or forward it to someone else. If your bank later determines that their payment was fraudulent. vou'll be out the cash they sent you as well as whatever money you sent out.

Romance scams can target anyone, and some scammers form platonic rather than romantic relationships."

As you will notice, my reference sources are from the Federal Government and financial services. This is because the fraud that these scammers are doing is all about money. The scam could be about your health, a family members safety, romance/friendship or your bank. The sad thing is that the scammers persist and when they get your money -it is very hard to get it back.

Use your caller ID, do not answer calls from unknown numbers. If you do answer the phone, hang up as soon as you realize it is not someone you know. If you do get a call from a scammer, (using your caller ID) write down the number and the name that they give you. Hang up and Report telephone scams online to the Federal Trade Commission. You can also call 1-877-382-(TTY: 1-866-653-4357 4261). The FTC is the primary government agency that collects scam complaints.

Windows 11 was released on October 5, 2021. I receive calls about upgrading your Windows 10 computer to Windows 11. Here is what you need to do By David Gewirtz on ZDnet;

So you want to move to Windows 11 and your PC has the Microsoft-approved hardware to handle it. What do you do? We take you through the process stepby-step.

Checking for compatibility

Not all Windows 10 machines can run Windows 11. It's a good idea to check whether Microsoft thinks you'll have an easy install. I always like to start on the Check for Updates screen, which I reach by typing "windows update" into the search bar.

My machine was already up to date (because I'm obsessive about running updates). While it's not required that you fully update Windows 10 first, before moving to Windows 11, I'd recommend it. That may be superstition because, after all, you're about to install a whole new OS. But I'm always more comfortable if I know I brought the old OS forward as far as possible before diving into the upgrade process. Go ahead and hit the Check hardware requirements link. It will launch Edge (or your default browser) and take you to a page that tells you about Windows 11. Go ahead and

click Learn More, and you'll get another page: Click Check for Compatibility. Go ahead and download the PC Health Check App. Launch it once it's in your Downloads directory. I don't see any reason to put a shortcut on the desktop. You're probably only going to run this thing once. So let's run it. Hit Finish. Now, punch that Check now button.

Boom! If everything's good, you'll see that and you are ready to upgrade. The easiest way to get Windows 11 if it's not already showing up on your PC and Microsoft's not already nagging you to upgrade, is to point your browser to https://www. microsoft.com/en-us/software-download/windows11. You'll want to use the Windows 11 Installation Assistant before you do make sure all your computer drivers are current and up to date to include the BIOS go to your manufactures website run a scan on your computer to see if there are any updates before you upgrade to Windows 11 if you do not do this step Windows 11 upgrade will fail.

From the Microsoft Website follow the instructions then Click Accept and Install. It should not take very long to get your download, depends on your internet bandwidth. Definitely assume you're going to be having a cup of coffee during the wait.



4 Boneless pork chops

1 Cup all purpose flour 1 1/2 Tbsp smoked pap-

1 tsp black pepper 1 tsp cayenne 1 tsp Badia Sazon Com-

plete seasoning

- 3 eggs 1 Tbsp hot sauce
- Vegetable oil for frying

Your choice of brown gravy

Preheat oven to 350 degrees

Ingredients for Green bean casserole

1 can cream of mushroom soup

- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 tsp soy sauce
- 2 cans green beans

1 cup fried onion rings plus 1/3 cup for top

In large bowl mix soup, milk, soy sauce, green beans and 1 cup fried onion rings. Put in a casserole dish




and bake for 30 minutes then add 1/3 cup fried onion rings and bake 5 more minutes.

While that's baking, Put each pork chop into folded plastic wrap and lightly pound to flatten slightly. I used the side of a rolling pin. They spread out pretty easy. You can use the side of a hammer also. In shallow bowl mix with a whisk the flour, paprika, black pepper, cayenne and Sazon complete seasoning. In separate shallow bowl beat the eggs with the hot sauce. Dredge each chop in seasoned flour, then in egg, then back in flour again. The easiest way to do this is with your fingers. Heat 1/4" of oil over medium high heat in heavy frying pan or Dutch oven and fry each chop a few minutes per side until nice and brown.
